We need all the information that is starred (date - time - diamond, visiting and home teams, scores, and pitchers used, and pitches thrown for *both* sides, plus the winning pitcher and save). This game card form is to help your scorekeeper keep track of the NSYBA required information. Some leagues find this game card form useful for paying umpires and internal record keeping. Hence the other lines. Check with your community representative to see if your league needs this information.

Here's the easiest way to track this vital information. The *home* team scorekeeper fills out the header *before* the first pitch. Then, as the game progresses, he/she keeps track of the pitchers used and innings pitched for both teams, a simple enough matter since scorekeepers are supposed to compare scores between each inning anyway. Then the home team's scorekeeper gives the completed game card form to the winning manager.
